



Self Analysis of the Institution Part II of The Self Study Report of Sarat Centenary College, Dhaniakhali, Hooghly, West Bengal

PROFILE OF THE COLLEGE

Introduction

arat Centenary College is situated at Dhaniakhali in Chinsurah Subdivision of Hooghly, West Bengal in the trans Damodar –Bhagirathi deltaic region which is linked with the nearby towns and cities by Howrah – Budrwan chord rail and road ways. Since the pre British period this region has been renowned for her cotton handloom industry and agricultural economy. Not only that, Dhaniakhali is famous for her role in the history of anti- British mass struggles through the swadeshi, Gandhian and the Tebhaga movements. Culturally too this locality is marked with the features of traditionality and modernity. The total population of the Dhaniakhali Block is recently estimated to be 2,93,305 of which 30% belongs to the schedule castes, and 4% to the schedule tribes. The artisans engaged in weaving and other small-scale industries, rich peasants and the landless proletariat have formed the majority of the total population. With the mission of spreading higher education to the socially and economically backward sections of the locality, the college was founded in 1976 by the local enterprising people with the public donation and land grants. The Government of West Bengal initially gave it recognition as junior college with higher Secondary course. Later it was upgraded to a degree college under the grant in –aid scheme of the government and it was extended affiliation of by the University of Burdwan with all the three streams – Arts, Science and Commerce. In 1990s Honours courses had been extended affiliation to this college by the University of Burdwan in Political Science, English, Mathematics, Accountancy and later in History and Bengali in response

to the growing public demand emerging from the changing socio-economic scenario in the rural sector of economy. Extension of affiliation of geography general in course has been made to this college under self-finance scheme from the session 2002 — 03. Of late, the proposals have been forwarded to the West Bengal Council for Higher Education, and the University of Burdwan seeking extension of affiliation to Honours courses in chemistry, Philosophy, Sanskrit, Geography under self finance scheme with the completion of the constructions of the new class rooms with the grant received from the M.P. and M.L.A. Local Area Development Fund. The Governing Body of this college has recently adopted resolutions to introduce vocational courses in pisciculture, seed technology and printing technology suitable to the local environment of economy. The college is making efforts to introduce computer training center. Meanwhile the West Bengal Council for Higher Secondary Education had withdrawn the affiliation to the H.S. courses in pursurance of the principle taken by the Government of West Bengal in 2002.

Infrastructural facilities now provided to the taught have now developed largely with the grants from the U.G.C. State Government, M.P., M.L.A Local Area Development Funds, Public donations, and the self resources of the college. It is noteworthy to say that the college recently Completed three spacious class rooms on the 2^{nd} floor of the old college building with the resources collected from the local people, the members of the teaching and the nonteaching staff as well as from the development fund of the college, to mark the Silver Jubilee celebration of the college observed in 2001 - 2002.

The college is proud to have a good library furnished with a good stock of books both texts and references and academic journals. The college has separate laboratories each for physics, chemistry, Mathematics, Zoology and Botany for practical classes. With its own resources the college has founded and developed a laboratory for the Geography course (general) under self-finance scheme. The college can pride itself on its N.C.C. units established in 1981 under the Army wing, 43 Bengal battalions, Chinsurah. Recently the girls students of this college have been inducted to this unit. 'B' and 'C' certificates are offered to the successful cadets in the N.C.C. examinations. With getting this training some of the ex-students of this college have been serving the country as army personnels. This college has been running two N.S.S. units which link the students and the teachers and the non-teaching staff with the local environments through social services. Recently a Science Club has been floated by the N.S.S. consisting of the N.S.S. volunteers and the Science teachers of this college. The college students union constituted each year according to the Statute of the University of Burdwan, consisting of the student members elected for one year by the regular students plays a responsible role for the all-round developments of this institution.

Since mid – 1980s the college has made a steady progress trying to elevate the academic, social and cultural life inside the campus and it becomes a center of cultural activities in the region. The institution started with only thirty students is now having the strength nearly one thousand four hundred students. Several of our fomer students have attained position of distinction in various segments of life. Some of the young medical practitioners, engineers, judges, advocates, teachers at the college and university levels home and abroad, are the ex-students of this institution. The college offers all sorts of opportunities, to its students to shine in sports, debate and other cultural activities. The college has a big play ground for out door games. The college through the students union organises Annual Social and cultural functions in which the students, teachers and the non-teaching staff have taken active parts. A group of the ex-students of the college have established a drama association in the locality which go on staging plays in the Annual cultural functions of the college. Some of the former and present students and one teacher of the college have got chances to telecast their cultural performances through the different channels of the Television.

There are twenty two full time non teaching staff, and twenty seven full time teaching staff of which fifteen members have acquired Ph.D degree and three M.Phil degree. There are nineteen part time teachers engaged by the college through selection committee who are paid by the college from its own fund. For the benefit of the teaching and the non teaching staff the college runs employees credit cooperative society affiliated with the Hooghly District central cooperative Bank Ltd. The Memorable days, (The few of which are Independence day, Republic Day, birth anniversaries of M. Gandhi, Netaji S.C.Bose, R.N. Tagore, Guru Nanak, S.C. Chattopadhyay, Nabi Dibas) are observed and celebrated luminously at the college premises through varying programmes and performances. In commemoration of the birth-day of Sarat Chandra Chattopadhyay after whom the college has been named, Sarat Smarak Baktrita as annual lecture has been introduced recently by the Governing Body of the college. The N.C.C. cadets and the N.S.S. Volunteers perform different social works on those red letter days. A State Level Seminar on "The Post-Modern Themes on Social Sciences" funded by the U.G.C was held on 28th and 29th November 2002 under the hostage of the college. Some resource persons of towering scholastic distinction, hailed from kolkata and Burdwan, gave to the seminar a stamp of enormous height and diversity of perfection for which it was organised. This was well attended by the scholars, teachers and the student from the different universities and colleges. The proceedings and papers of the seminars have been developed into a book brought out recently with the financial assistance from the college. Yet this college has many points of weakness and suffers from limitations to reach its goals. But we are resolute to overcome those through our united efforts and industriousness.

CRITERION 1

CURRICULAR ASPECTS :

i) <u>Compatibility of the programmes with goals and objectives :</u> Since the foundation of the college, the organizational committee had chartered objectives to spread higher education and knowledge specially among the down-trodden sections of the society and to provide equal opportunities for access to higher

education to this section and to develop and upgrade the conditions of the people economically and culturally. The courses affiliated to this college by the University are compatible with the goals and objectives of the institution. The courses provide avenues of employment and access to both post graduate education and competitive examinations. But it is equally true that only conventional subjects have been introduced during the last of twenty five years to cater to the needs and demands of the locality. The Governing Body has recently taken resolutions and efforts to introduce vocational course in the fields as stated above.

ii) Initiation, review and redesign of programmes : The college plays an important role in the process of initiation and revision of syllabi. The Heads of the departments of the respective subects, taught in the college, participate in the workshops organised by the university to review the proposals for revision of syllabi. The introduction of the new courses in addition to the existing ones is difficult for the college since the state Government is not creating new teaching posts. However, the college has introduced Geography (General) under self-finance scheme from the session 2002-03 and sought extension of affiliation to Honours courses in chemistry, physics, philosophy, Sanskrit and Geography under self-finance scheme. The college is not in a position to appoint full time teachers in the department of geography run under the above scheme due to the financial constraints.

iii) **Feed back on programmes :** The college does not have any method of obtaining feed back from academic peers regarding the course contents.

iv) **<u>Programme options</u>**: The institution offers B.A, B.SC, (Pure and bio) and B.Com programmes. Four subjects in Arts, one subject in science and one in commerce have been offered at honours level. Efforts have also been made to introduce Honours course in other subjects in Arts and science. B.A(general) students have been offered options to choose three combination subjects in total which are divided into two groups. They have to choose either all the three

subjects of group A or any two of group A and one of Group B. The students having Honours course have to choose two combination subjects – one from group A and another from Group B. In Science and commerce streams there are no options for the students.

CRITERION 2

<u>Teaching – Learning & Evaluation :</u>

- Judging students' know ledge & bridge remedial courses: Annual i) Examinations and Test Examinations are held regularly. Only those of the students who qualify themselves through their performance in the Test Examination are sent up for the Final University Examinations. Recently tutorial classes are organised for the students showing poor performance. But the college can not hold class tests regularly for want of teaching days. Recently attempts have been made to introduce remedial course for the socially and economically backward sections specially the scheduled caste and scheduled tribe students with the partial grant received from the U.G.C in the Tenth plan period. For the shortage of staff we fail to hold tutorial classes for the students in General courses in Arts. The chief-most constraints and obstructions underlie the holding of the need-based class tests and Tutorial classes due to the massive spectrum of syllabi prescribed by the University as well as for the dearth of working days at the college as scheduled by the University. Yet the faculties leave no stone unturned to hold class tests and tutorial classes as and when possible and feasible.
- **Teaching Learning process & use of New Technology in Teaching:** The College has already taken pride in the quality of teaching. Regarding the admission of the students the college wants to stick to the principles of academic merit shown by the candidate in the last public Examinations (H.S or equivalent examinations). But the college relies on conventional teaching method which is supplemented by multi

dimensional approaches like laboratory works, academic tours, field surveys and proper interactions with the students. Recently Computers have been installed in the Department of Mathematics. For the Department of zoology the college has purchased an over Head projector with the financial assistance from the U.G.C. Efforts have been made by the college to purchase more modern teaching aids within a very short period.

- iii) <u>Co curricular Activities:</u> The college has a tradition of well-balanced charter of games and sports and cultural activities annually framed. It has a good play ground for soccer and cricket tournament and practices and for holding annual sports meets. Through the students' union the college holds social and cultural functions and competitions in which the students take always active part with the assistance from the teaching, non-teaching staff as well as the members of the alumni association. The college holds debate, extempore lecture, music (vocal), recitation competitions and extempore dramatic displays under the leadership of the students union. Prizes are awarded to the winner on the spot. The college tries to provide more opportunity for sports and games and cultural activities. Recently the college has received a grant of Rupees Three lakhs from the Union Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports for the purchase of non-consumable goods for the infra-structural development of sports and games of the College. Tue utilization of this grant would help the college renovate the infrastructure of the games and sports.
- iv) <u>Examination process and innovatives Evaluation Method</u>: The college conducts Annual examinations, Test examinations. Besides, the respective departments hold class tests. The patterns of questions in these examinations are modelled after the patterns framed by the University of Burdwan.

- v) <u>Recruitment of faculty and faculty Development programme :</u> The College recruits the full time teachers against the approved posts in pursuance of recommendation of the West Bengal College Service Commission following the norms of the 100-point Roster. The engagement of the part time teachers are made by the college under self finance scheme through the respective selection committees constituted by the Governing body of the college. The selection committee consists of three members from amongst the members of the Governing body and one subject expert. Since the college is located far away from the urban area, it is not always easy to find suitable candidates for engagement as part time teachers specially in science subjects inspite of proper advertisements for it through the state level and local newspapers. Selections of part time teachers are made on the basis of the twin principle of merit and credit.
- vi) Evaluation of Teaching, Research and Work satisfaction of the faculty: The college evaluates the performance of the teacher mainly through students' responses and the teachers' self-assessments with full co-operation of the teachers themselves. The faculty-wise results of the Final Examinations work as barometers to read the parameters of the teachers worth proficiency and efficiency. Intensive research works of the faculty members testifies to their academic professionalism and intellectual depth.
- vii) <u>Access to the National and international linkages :</u> The college is located in a remote rural area and it has not been possible to establish frequent linkages with the rich institutions. However the college encourages the teachers to establish such linkages. One teacher in the department of zoology has been nominated as an International Scientist of the year,2004 by the International Biographical center, Cambridge, CB2 3QP England. The same organization has declared him as one of

the outstanding scientists of the 21st century. One teacher in the department of Sanskrit has been declared as 'Woman of the year' by the American Biographical institute, INC, U.S.A, 2001. One senior teacher in the department of Botany had shown proven credit to win Young Scientist Award' from the Department of Science and Technology, New Delhi, Nov.1995. This is no mean achievement for a rural college. Some of the teachers maintain such linkages through attending and presenting papers in the National and International Seminars. Beside, most of the teachers have access to the National library, Asiatic Society, Institute of R.K. Mission Institute of Culture, Center for Social Sciences, Kolkata and the Universities of Kolkata, Jadavpur, Burdwan and a variety of NGOs of philanthropic order.

CRITRION 3:

Research, consultancy and Extension output :

 i) Promotion and Sustemance of research Culture and research output : An undergraduate college do not have much scope for research. However, one teacher in the department of Political Science received grant from the U.G.C under post – doctoral Minor research Project in the IXth Plan period and he has duly completed his research project. The college promotes research projects by sanctioning study leave as permitted by the University statute for the Ph.D degree and encourages research on topics of social relevance. Two teachers in Arts faculty have brought out recently two research oriented books in social science. Recently a corpus of research papers written by the teachers of different faculties has been brought out in the form of academic Journal. The teachers of this college have also contributed a good numbers of papers in the proceeding volume of the State Level Seminar organised by this college in Nov. 2002 under the financial assistance from the U.G.C. One of the teachers in the Department of Sanskrit presented paper in the oriental conference held at Helsinki, Finland in 2003. In different national and international levels of seminars some of the teachers presented papers and acted as guest speakers as well. One of the teachers is conducting research works leading to the Ph.D degree as supervisor of a scholar in the department of History, The University of Burdwan. Another teacher in the department of mathematics has got permission from the Register, the University of Burdwan. Another teacher in the same department acted as joint supervisor for the Ph.D. works under the Indian School of mines, Dhanbad. One teacher in the department of History and two in the department of Political Science have been engaged in the post doctoral works. One teacher in the department of physics and another in the department of political Science have been doing research works for the Ph.D degree in the University of Jadavpur and the University of Burdwan respectively. The former teachers' have brought out a numbers of papers in the leading research Journals as a Joint author.

ii) <u>Consultancy undertaken by the teachers :</u> Several teachers lend their expertise knowledge for the benefit of other institutions. One Senior – most teacher in the department of Mathematics has been working as a part time associate of Netaji Open University, Kolkata, offering under –graduage course of studies throughout the country. Two teachers in the department of Mathematics have prepared study materials for the Netaji Open University, Kolkata. Similarly another teacher in the department of Zoology has

contributed the same for the under gradate correspondence course of studies under the University of Burdwan. One of the teachers in the department of political Science has done the same at the post graduate correspondence course of studies in the same University. Besides the teachers of this college act as expert in the recruitment of school teachers' through the West Bengal School Service Commission, judge in debating and other central competitions. Some of them are acting as member in the school managing committee, and to the Employers Cooperative Society. One of the teachers in the department of Mathematics has been serving as guest lecturer in the Bachelor of Education department under the University of Burdwan. One of the teachers in the department of history has been invited recently by the department of History, Jadavpur University to act as panel speaker in the National level Seminar. The same teacher has been invited by the department of Islamic History and Culture, Calcutta University to deliver lecture in the departmental Seminar. The Principal of this college has acted as one of the members of the committee / board formed by the University of Burdwan and West Bengal School service Commission respectively. Three teachers of this college have been closely linked with the social activities in the locality through the Lions Club and other NGOs.

 iii) Extension activities, faculty participation in extension programmer and resources to conduct extension activities : The college has undertaken a large variety of extension programmes. In collaboration with the Presidency College, Kolkata, this college organised a 'Campus Diversity Initiative programmes conducting 6 – month based socio – economic research and survey works jointly with the students and guide – teachers of the Presidency College in 1997 - 98.

Through organizing some youth parliaments at the college under the financial assistance of the State Government the college made efforts to create awareness among the students about the system of parliamentary democracy in the country. 10 th December, universally declared as the 'International Human Rights' Day' was observed this year by the college by organizing a Seminar on Human Rights on the day. The Professor of Law, Burdwan University, graced the Seminar with a mark of proficiency as a Resource Person. Clarion advice and call was imparted to the assemblage of the participants to make the common people aware of the mode and process of protection of human rights against the aggressive designs. The N.C.C, the N.S.S. units and the Alumnus jointly held the blood donation camps in the college campus. Special mention of credit may be made of the fact that the N.C.C. and the N.S.S. units in collaboration with the gram Panchayats and the Block Development office perform a variety of functions like forestations, removal of garbages, renovation of rural streets, eradication of pollution, group drives among the ignorant rural common people on multifarious health and hygiene awareness programmes like AIDS, malnutrition of children and pre-natal and post-natal mothers, epidemic diseases and eradication of illiteracy and superstitions so on and so forth. Notably the N.C.C. undergoes distant camps as designed by the higher authority. The N.S.S. units held camp services in the adopted village on diverse occasions to generate awareness of socio-economic-physicho spheres of life. As there is a well equipped rural Hospital in the vicinity of the college hitherto we have not done any efforts to introduce a health clinic in the premises of the college. However an effort has recently been taken to start the same in collaboration with the local branch of the Lions Club.

CRITERION 4:

Infrastructure and learning Resources :

i) **Physical facilities and their optimal use :** The College has four separate buildings. The main building is mainly two storied containing class rooms, Science laboratories, staff rooms, ladies common room and administrative units which was built at the initial stage of the foundation of the college with the public charity. In commemoration of the silver jubilee anniversary in 2001 - 2002 the western portion of the old building has been elevated to the second floor constructed with the fund raised from the public donations, and donations from the teaching and the non-teaching staff and contribution from the own resources of the college. In the Southern portion of the campus there is a two storied building. The first floor was built with the assistance grant from the U.G.C. in the IXth plan period along with the matching share from the college as well as the State Government which contains one specious class room. Its first floor has been built with the M.L.A. Local Area Development Fund as well as the self finance of the college. This floor is used as an auditorium. There is a newly built three storied building containing four class rooms with a guest room which has been built with the grant received from the M.P. and M.L.A. Local Area Development Fund as well as the self resources of the college. The two-storied library building was constructed with the assistance grant from the U.G.C. in the IXth Plan along with the matching share from the resources of the college fund. The 1st floor is used as the reading room of the students. There is a separate students common room which was constructed with the public fund. In the morning hour a portion of the common room is used for holding Anganwari class room by the Local Panchayat.

The College has laboratories for science and Geography departments. The equipments of the laboratories of Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology and Mathematics were purchased with the U.G.C. assistance grants during different plan periods, and with the contributions from the college fund. But the equipments for the laboratory of the Department of Geography were

extensively purchased with the fund from the College as it has been run under self finance scheme

The college auditorium though not well furnished has capacity of accommodation of five hundred audience which has been used generally for holding seminars and cultural functions. The government and non government social organizations are allowed to use this auditorium. Of late the annual conference of the North-Hooghly unit of the WBCUTA was held in the auditorium and the premises of the college with the assemblage of hundreds of teachers and scholars.

The college has a well sized play ground in front of the main building. The students play and practice football, cricket. The college holds annual athlete meets and annual Social and Cultural functions, football and cricket tournaments. The other educational institutions, the local Gram Panchayats and the Panchayet Samity are allowed to use the grounds according to their approaches. During the time of the three tier Panchayat elections and also in the General elections the entire college campus is requisitioned by the State Government.

The college has a cheap canteen and a cycle shade though not elegantly elevated. The college has a bore well within its campus to provide drinking water to the students and the staff. It maintains a proper sanitary arrangements. The college authority takes extra care for maintenance of the infrastructure. Funds are kept earmarked in the college annual budget for repairing buildings, equipments. The shortage of fund debarred the college from constructing the boundary wall. But steps in right earnest have been taken to raise funds for the construction of the same as early as possible.

 The college provides good library facilities to the students as well as the teaching and the non-teaching staff. It has a book bank. It has inter library lending facilities to a small extent. The library has a separate reading room. Recently steps have been taken to computerise the library for its high-tech operation.

- iii) <u>Computer Facilities :</u> The college has purchased five computer sets, two for the mathematics department, one for the library and two for the administrative units. The college is making more efforts to computerise the library, and administrative units. One computer operator has been engaged on temporary basis with the resources from the college fund.
- iv) Other facilities: The College has both the indoor and outdoor games and sports facilities. The college has cheap canteen facilities. A canteen committee supervises the canteen. The college has a well furnished guest room. However it has arrangements with the private lodge nearby which provides accommodation for the guests of the college at a concessional rate. Besides, the Zillaparishad circuit house also helps us with provision of accommodation for the guests of this institution at a cheap rate.

CRITERION 5.

Student Support and Progression :

i) **Progression to employment and further study :** The college does not maintain record of its old students. The college owes to a place of pride to note that lots of the ex-students are now ranked and renowned medical specialists, engineers, professors of universities, home and abroad, judges of courts, senior nurses in hospitals and the like. The system of counselling about the avenues of employments in diverse fields and professions are made manifest among the students by the teachers in classrooms and outside. Recently a seminar has been organized by the college in collaboration with the District Industries Centre, Hooghly, Chinsurah and the Dhaniakhali Block Development

Office and the Panchayat Samiti relating to focus the job opportunity open to the students in the different sectors of every after completion of their undergraduate courses. This breeds ardent impetus among the students which could help them achieve the aims in life.10% of the students passing out of the college get themselves admitted to the post gradate courses of studies in the different universities. Some of them are engaged in employment mainly in agricultural and weaving industries. Some are engaged in trades and petty business.

- ii) Pass and dropout rate and students achievement : The college has a substantial drop-out rate which has become the common trend else where for reasons not known. The pass-rates of the students in the degree examinations both in Honours and general courses is always 80%. More than 50% students obtain above 55% marks. 5% of the students obtain 60% marks in the degree final examinations. In the degree Part-II examination 2004, one student in commerce scored 1st class second place.The tables regarding the place of position of the colleges in the district of Hooghly in Part II Examinations. (Honours), 2004, framed by the journal of Education, WBCUTA, reveal that our college has been ranked 9th in Accountancy with the score of 77.78 p.c. result ratio, Second in political science with the score. This proves the worth of lofty academic performance of the College.
- iii) **Financial Aid :** The college provides financial aid to the meritorious and needy students in the forms of stipend, free studentship, half free studentship apart from Government scholarships and stipends. The students belonging to the SC and ST are getting stipends. Attempts have been made to award the students scoring highest marks in the respective faculties. The college provides assistance to the needy cum meritorious students to secure financial assistance from different non Government

organizations. The teachers often hold academic counselling to the students. The college provides guidance through the career guidance cell.

CRITERION 6.

Organisation and Management

i) **Decentralisation of Power:** The College is managed and governed by the Governing Body constituted and empowered in terms of the rules of the Government of West Bengal, and the status of the University of Burdwan.

The Governing Body of the College is comprised of one nominee of the Government of West Bengal (Education Directorate), three nominees of the University of Burdwan, two donor-members, three representative of the wholetime teachers, two representatives of the Non-teaching staff and one students' representative (notably the General Secretary of the Students' Union,) with the Principal acting as the Secretary to the Governing Body in terms of the St. 3 (G.B.) of the statute of the Burdwan University. The administration of the college is characterized by the decentralization of powers and responsibilities. The Governing Body has decentralized powers and responsibilities through formation of sub committee and different advisory committees consisting of the members from the teaching and the nonteaching staff as well as the students. But the finance subcommittee is constituted under the statute of the University of Burdwan (Statute No. 7 (G.B)(3) consisting of the members from among the members of the Governing Body. The Teachers' council is a statutory body consisting of the fulltime members of the teaching staff in terms of U. Rule 7 (T.C.) of the Burdwan University. It deals with the academic affairs of the college with powers and functions scheduled by the University. The Students' union is also another statutory body constituted with the member elected by the students. The General

Secretary of the students' union is the ex-officio members of the Governing Body. Under the statute of the university of Burdwan the tenure of the Governing Body is three years. Under the guide line of the U.G.C in the X plan periods, a building committee has been constituted for construction of the same with the grant from it. The building committee with extended form been empowered by the governing body to supervise the other construction and repairing works of the college too. Such decentralization of powers and responsibilities is done within the parameters set by the University of Burdwan and the Governing Body of the College. The individual development is endowed with relative autonomy so far as the academic matters are concerned under the guidance of the Governing Body. Transparency is the motto of the college administration under the Governing Body.

ii) Human power requirement and recruitment of staff : -

The college does not have any power to recruit permanent staff on its own. As a result, it is not possible to place adequate staff for all types of work.

But the college engages the part time teachers as well as the part time nonteaching staff as per requirements through the constituted selection committees.

iii) <u>**Performance of Appraisal :**</u> The performance of appraisal of the teaching and the non-teaching staff is done by the college at the end of the year.

iv) Welfare schemes and grievance redressed mechanism : The college has initiated a number of welfare schemes for both teachers and non teaching staff. The college has employees' cooperative society for all staff members which is linked with the Hooghly District Central Co-operative Bank Limited. The employers can borrow different types of loans from this cooperative society at a lower rate of interest as determined by the Board of Directors elected by its members in the Annual general meeting. Some times college sanctions short term loan without interest to the full time individual employee of the college when he falls in dire need of money on medical ground. Besides the college makes linkage with the local branch of Allahabad Bank from which the full time employee could borrow loan at a rate of interest fixed by the bank. The collage has a Grievance Redressal cell where any staff members or student can submit grievances in writing. This cell is constituted with two teaching members and one non teaching members and the general secretary of the students union.

CRITERION 7:

Healthy practices :-

The college organises various functions every year to spread message of unity and brotherhood amongst all those who are associated with the institution. The college observes Independence Day, Republic Day, World Human Rights Day. The college organises annual social and cultural function, annual sports and games, football and cricket tournament. The students are encouraged in debate, extempore lecture, reception and vocal music competitions. The N.C.C. and N.S.S. volunteers take part in different social service programmes. The N.C.C cadets take part in ceremonious parade competition organised under the army wing 43 Bengal battalion. Different camps like CATC, ATC, PRDC, RDC, NIC Trek Camps etc. are arranged by this unit althrough the year. Recently a unit for the girls' student has been introduced. They are encouraged to enroll their names as cadets. The N.C.C. and N.S.S. units help the students become much more conscious, bold and patriotic as citizens who are always ready to serve the country in need. Meritorious students of the college as well as the persons excel in sports and games and social and cultural function are given prizes at the annual prize distribution programme held generally on the day fixed or annual social and cultural function.

The colleges has taken programme to hold every year 'Sarat Smarak Baktrita' to commemorate the birth anniversary of sarat chandra chattopadhyay of whose centenary year the college was established. Besides. State level, departmental and inter departmental seminars are held in which the college teacher read their papers. Many of the teachers have been engaged in the post doctoral research works. Some of them maintain national and international linkages.

The college introduces self financing course in geography and has sent proposals to introduce more courses under the same scheme in view of the requirements of the locality. The college has taken decision to introduce vocational course suitable to the local environment. The college publishes annual journal for the students in each number there are many promising writings written by the young student. Not only that, the teachers too contribute to the annual college magazine

Recently an academic journal No. - I containing research – oriented articles contributed by the teachers brought out.

The college organises blood donation camps and programmes for plantations. The staff and the students of this college are also sensitive to national problems. Donations from the staff were made to victims at the genocide of Gujarat and natural calamities like earth quake and floods.

Conclusions :

It is evident from the report that strength of the college lies in the collective cooperation and wisdom of the staff and active support of the management. Work culture is democratic. Powers and responsibilities are decentralized. The management provides moral and financial support. But principal financial support comes from the state government and the U.G.C. Maximum use of the available infrastructures is made. All members of the management, the teachers, and non-searching staff have been striving to achieve the goals of the institution. The


results of the students in the university examination are satisfactory and are compatible with the university success rate.

Description of Master Plan:

A.Existing Buildings / Facilities :

A.1 Main College Building :- Mainly a two storied building except front portion being 3 storey, consisting of class rooms, administrative units including Principal's room, staff room, ladies common room, NCC/NSS room, store room, WC Lavoratory block, Laboratory unit for Chemistry, Physics, Biology, Zoology, Mathematics, Geography, & Computer.



A.2 Library Building :- Two storied building consisting of rooms for office and books at ground floor while reading room at 1st floor.



A.3 MLA/MP Building :- Three storied building having one class room at ground floor, one class room and guest room at 1^{st} floor and two class rooms at 2^{nd} floor.



A4. UGC Building :- A two storied building at the entrance from Southern Point of the college. This building is consisting of one class room at ground floor and the 1st floor is being used as Auditorium.



A5.Students Sansad Bhavan :- One storey building being used for Students Common Room during college hours while in the morning the same is being used as Anganwari class/teaching room run by the local Panchayat.



A6. Cycle Shade :- This temporary shade is being used as Cycle garage.



A7. Football Ground :- A big playground is situated at the North-West side of the college campus.



A8. College Pond :- In front of the UGC Building there is a big college pond.



B. Proposed Buildings / Facilities :-

B1. Administrative Building :- A three storied building having 3000 sqft area in all the three floors is proposed to accommodate the entire administrative unit of the college as shown in the plan.

B2. Laboratory Building :- A three storied laboratory building will be necessary for the college to keep pace with the requirements in the future, where all the laboratory facilities will be accommodated. Approx.2700 sqft per floor may be sufficient .

B3. Computer Building :- For Computer education a separate building has been proposed.

B4. Commerce Building :- As located in the plan a two storied building earmarked for class room of the Commerce Faculty has been sanctioned and the construction activity will start soon.

B5. Hostel building:- A building of 5000 sqft per floor has been proposed as shown in the Plan.

B6. Cycle Shade :- Additional Cycle Shade is proposed by the side of the existing one.

B7.Security Quarter:- A twin security quarter is proposed to accommodate future requirements when the entire college compound will be enclosed by solid boundary wall and the security arrangement would become inevitable.

B8. Staff Quarter:- A three storied twin type staff quarter is proposed at the Western side of the college compound.
