

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ANNEXURE II

Best Practice-1

Title of the Practice: Ensuring education to the students of the socio-economically backward society of this college through extending financial support.

Goal: Providing quality education for all students including the economically weaker section, irrespective of their caste, creed or religion.

The Context: Dhaniakhali is the Assembly Constituency reserved for SC candidate, where the institute is located. Most of the students of this college come from underprivileged weaker section of the society and many of them are first generation learner. A wide number of students from the underprivileged section of the society including tribal, minority and other reserved categories are always intermingled with the facts of poverty and lack of academic access. The student support system of this college is essentially recommended from the above mentioned facts and also considering the high percentage of dropout rate.

The Practice: Considering the challenge in respect to provide education for all, the college authority framed the policy of assisting the poor students, to the best of its potential. The funds received from the Government of India, Government of West Bengal and other Non Government Organisations, meant for the needy backward students are effectively utilised with utmost clarity and transparency. To meet the requirement, the college provides financial assistance to the poor students of socio-economically backward section of the society from its own funds under the schemes of 'full-free-ship', 'half-free-ship' and 'poor-fund'. The whole process is maintained in a transparent manner through a committee called 'Students' Welfare Committee' comsisting of a senior teaching member as President, a non-teaching member, General Secretary of the Students' Union and Secretary of the Students' Welfare Committee. Final dispensation occurs after receiving and scrutinising applications received from the poor students.

Evidence of Success: Large number of beneficiaries from the underprivileged section of the society can tells the acceptability of this system. This support system adopted by the college authority has created the opportunity in front of the students of this society. Year wise increasing number of beneficiaries of the student support system indicates the success of this initiative. About **48.64%** of total enrolled students in this institution have been benefitted from this student support systems in the academic session of 2010 - 2011.

Best Practice-2

The Context: The NSS and the different departments of this college are exerting their best possible efforts in making the students aware about their social responsibilities and environmental issues in respect to global aspect and specifically for nation development. It is not an easy task in an ever growing consumer culture but the progress towards the challenge is worth taking.

The Practice: The challenging tasks of such matters, the NSS units and also the different departments of the college taking regular initiatives and programmes in the college campus and also in the adjacent adopted villages as well as allied areas, in motivating the students and local people towards the noble tasks of blood donation and other social activities.
